Thank you for all the support you have shown GCBO. It is because of you that we have been able to continue positively affecting multiple issues facing the avifauna of the Americas.

Already in 2016:

- We contributed funds for an acquisition in the Sierra Gorda of Mexico
- Paid off the remaining debt from the construction of our Avian Conservation Science Center
- Held a special puppet workshop for youth with Heather Henson (daughter of Jim Henson of Muppet fame) and two of her staff members in February

However, there continue to be many challenges facing all conservation organizations, including GCBO. Weather and tidal patterns are negatively impacting beach nesting birds, the health and productivity of coastal estuaries are under constant pressure and the growing global population reduces available space where historical wildlife habitat once existed. There is much that needs to be done. Last week the North American Bird Conservation Initiative (NABCI) published The State of North America's Birds 2016, the first comprehensive report assessing the conservation status of all bird species that occur in Canada, the continental United States and Mexico. Of the 1,154 native

> species, 432 qualified for the Watch List, indicating they are species of highest conservation concern. It's not all bad though - the report reveals some success stories which we are all delighted to hear. This helps us understand that conservation action can and does work and motivates us to work harder towards our goals.

> With our mission as the focus and our determination to move forward for the birds we all love, GCBO is on track and running smoothly. AMERICAN OYSTERCATCHER

Over the course of our six year project monitoring American Oystercatchers in Texas, we have learned much about their habitat needs. Bad weather, eroding islands, and high tides plague their reproductive efforts every year. Due to extreme and long lasting high tides, 2016 is shaping up to have the lowest productivity of all six years of our study. With increasingly turbulent weather patterns, oystercatchers are struggling to maintain their foothold on the Texas coast. It is important that we continue to monitor their productivity each year so that we can begin restoration efforts on their behalf. Designate your donation for the American Oystercatcher and help us continue to monitor this unique and amazing shorebird.

BEACH NESTING BIRDS

GCBO has worked with American Bird Conservancy on a Beach Nesting Birds project since 2012. Over the course of this project we have contributed to signage on nesting islands, a public service announcement, public education programs,



and much more. In 2014 we began monitoring the Black Skimmer colony at the Dow plant in Freeport which is one of the largest colonies on the entire Texas coast. Now in 2016, in addition to the skimmers, we have begun monitoring nesting

Wilson's and Snowy Plovers and Least Terns at two sites, one in Brazoria County and one in Matagorda County. These birds struggle to raise their young every year while dealing with mammalian predation, human disturbance, and over wash on our very public beaches. This project is helping to determine what parameters are most important for their nesting success and what we can do to help them in their quest to raise their young. SMITH POINT HAWK WATCH

Each year we run the Smith Point Hawk Watch on a shoestring budget in order to keep this important raptor monitoring project alive. 2016 will mark the 20th season GCBO has managed the hawk watch and means there will be an incredible 20 year dataset for raptor migration on

the upper Texas coast. Datasets of this length are very rare which illustrates the importance of continuing this monitoring project. Plans are underway to make the 20th season the best so far! Help us keep this project alive by designating your donation for the Smith Point Hawk Watch.

GCBO FLOOD RECOVERY

As I write this letter, we are evacuated from our headquarters facility due to a historic flood of the Brazos River. Recovery will require an unprecedented amount of effort from our incredible volunteer force.
